## **CIVIL REQUIREMENTS**

Notice of Marriage must be given personally to the Registrar of Marriage, in the Marriage Registration District, in which you live, and this can be done within the 12 months period prior to the date of marriage.

**No marriage can take place** in the Catholic Church without a Registrar's Certificate / licence. This certificate/licence must be collected from the Office of the Registrar where notice of marriage was given and passed to the Priest prior to the date of wedding.

NB You are advised to take copies of your birth certificates when giving notice of your intention to marry. If you are under 23 years, your birth certificate must be produced.

## **CHURCH REQUIREMENTS**

1. Church Law obliges the priest to see that couples entering marriage receive due preparation.
2. The Catholic party must produce an up-to-date Baptismal Certificate, which should be obtained from the church in which you were baptised.
3. If you do not live in the parish of Windsor—permissions must be obtained by your local parish priest. It is that parish that Normally prepares the paperwork .
4. Catholics who marry someone who is not a Catholic undertake to continue living their own faith and to do all in their power to have the children of the marriage baptised and brought up in the Catholic faith.
5. The Bishop requests that as a norm, couples should give one year's notice for a wedding.

The Catholic should have received the Sacrament of Confirmation, and have been to Confession before the marriage takes place.

6. A rehearsal may be held a few days before the wedding.
7. Readings, Hymns and Music for the wedding must be agreed with the Priest.
8. Confetti is strictly forbidden in the Church grounds.
9. **Ushers:** It will help you to have two people detailed for this duty. They should arrive at the Church in good time to see to the opening and closing of doors, see guests have Service Books, and let the Priest and Organist know of the Bride's arrival.
10. There are normally flowers in the church. However, if you wish to have something special or more elaborate – then please make your arrangements with a florist. If flowers are being brought into the Church and then being taken to the place of reception, then you are asked to leave a small arrangement in front of the altar. Please inform Anne Ayrton-Grime / Mrs Mayhew of what you are doing. There details are on the back page.
11. **Car Parking:** Please note that from Monday—Friday there are only a very limited number of parking spaces available directly behind the Church. The larger car park is for permit holders only and cannot be used during the week. You will need to inform your guests to find alternative parking .



## MUSIC

Every marriage is a two-fold celebration, the church ceremony and the reception that follows. One is religious the other is secular, so the music in each part should conform to the occasion. The Catholic Church requires that the music during the church ceremony both express the faith of the church and be appropriate to the celebration. There are many fine secular songs and pieces of music which are excellent for the reception but are not suited for use in church.

Some couples request taped music, but the playing of pre-recorded music in the church would be breaking the law and could result in a substantial fine if detected. The only music permitted during acts of worship in the church is live music.

If you are providing your own service sheets, you should be aware that the church has a licence regarding copyright for re-printing of words, and the number should be printed in the small print at the end of the order of service.
